
## Villa Monterey Golf Course & Club House

Villa Monterey was the creation of David Friedman, head of Butler Homes Inc. His concept for a community of casitas was first realized in 1961 with the completion of what is now known as Villa Monterey I. Friedman saw the townhouse/casita concept as ideal for buyers in the earlier interim or transient stages of life, and for those in the latter stages who preferred low-maintenance property to "jet around the world without having to worry about what happens to the old homestead." In this market families no longer remained together "as they did in years gone by," and people retained a "spirit of living regardless of age" in contrast to "the Pullman-car days, when the old folks just sat on the front porch and rocked." This definition of the senior homeowner served as the vision behind the development of Villa Monterey's casita community. (All quotes from Friedman in the Arizonian, 1 Dec. 1996.)

To accommodate this modern lifestyle that seniors were experiencing, Villa Monterey offered a club house and golf course. The club house was located just east of Villa Monterey V, on land that is now developed as La Vallita.
